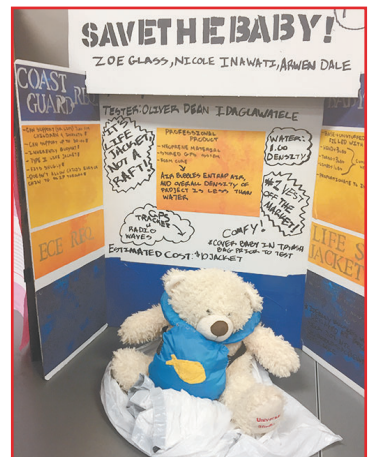

Region 4 Officer Visits HCHS

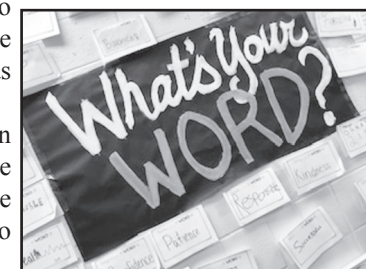
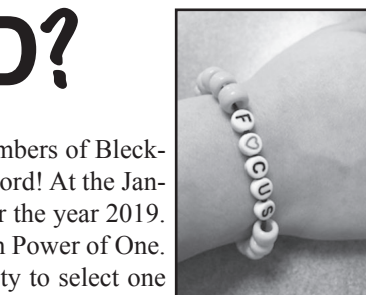

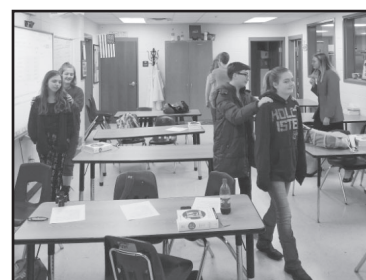
Madison dressed very professionally, including the "official" red blazer, and she was well prepared for the presentation. She explained the FCCLA dress code, code of conduct, and the FC-
