Chapter Fair Booth


- Chapter Event must be registered in chapter's name
- Two divisions Middle School and High School
- Display Set Up
 - September 25-28, 2019
 - Weekdays 9:00 am 5:00 pm
 - Saturday 10:00 am 3:00 pm
 - Only one day return trips to modify or complete is not allowed


Chapter Fair Booth

- Booth must be based on the current state or national programs
- Panels are supplied by the fair
- Decorations must be stapled or thumbtacked cannot use glue or paint
- Chapters are encouraged to pre-make displays that can slide into booth

Chapter Fair Booth

- No more than 5 students can help set up (with adviser)
- Electricity is available
- Display take down October 15-16 or October 19
- Cancellations please call the fair!
















Chili Cook Off

- Individual event must be registered in member's name
- Two divisions Middle School and High School
- Only 20 participants will be allowed more than that and a lottery drawing will determine the 20 participants
- Participants supply ingredients and cooking equipment
- Preparation is done from scratch no chili mixes

Chili Cook Off

- Teacher/adult can help move equipment, but cannot coach student
- Pay specific attention to food requirements

Peanut Recipe Competition

- Individual event must be entered in member's name
- Three divisions:
 - Middle School
 - Junior (Grades 9-10)
 - Senior (Grades 11-12)
- One entry per division
- Only 30 participants per division lottery drawing if needed

Peanut Recipe Competition

- Product type for 2019 Dessert item
- Bring with you:
 - Three ready-made servings on separate plates
 - Three copies of recipe on 4x6 index card

Culinary Competition

- Individual event must be entered in member's name
- Only for culinary students
- Only 10 participants, lottery drawing if need
- Judged on knife skills and preparation of "hot plated meal" –
 chicken breast (provided), starch, vegetable
- Pay close attention to food requirements

Knowledge Bowl

- Chapter Event enter in chapter's name
- Three divisions:
 - Culinary & FCCLA
 - High School FACS & FCCLA
 - Middle School & FCCLA
- Also register through Georgia FCCLA in the Fall Rally Registration System
 - Names of participants needed
 - Proctor name and email address needed

Knowledge Bowl – Qualification Testing

- Takes place September 23-27, 2019
- Proctors emailed information
- Must have four FCCLA members
- 50 question test
- Test only contains content question, no FCCLA questions
- Questions WILL NOT match study guide
- Top 16 teams will advance to final round

Knowledge Bowl – Buzzer Rounds

- Head-to-head questions
- Team questions
- Single elimination
- Questions come from study guide

Georgia Organics – Oh My Squash! Competition

- Only competition NOT ran through Georgia National Fair
- Sign up on Georgia Organics website to receive electronic resources
- Plan school activities by using resources
- Implement activity and post to social media
- Submit information to Wufoo form
- Entries are judged by Georgia Organics



 - Recruitment uniqueness






Fall Leadership Conference Competitions Tips and Tricks

Pin Design Competition

- Submitted as a PDF ahead of time
- Must be original artwork
- Use characteristics unique to Georgia (no trademarked or copyrighted material)
- 6 colors only (including black and white)
- Top entries on display and voted on by chapters at FLC


T-Shirt Design Competition

- Submitted as a PDF ahead of time
- Must be original artwork
- Must use national theme Your Story
- Chapter name and FCCLA logo must be on shirt (used correctly)
- No trademarked or copyrighted material
- Top entries to be voted on by chapters


Statesman Test

- FCCLA knowledge-based test
- \$5 registration fee
- Study guide provided questions come directly from study guide
- 50 multiple choice questions
- Scantron and pencils provided
- Must make an 85% to be awarded Statesman

Fall Leadership Conference Competitions Tips and Tricks

Distinguished Statesman Test

- For members who have previously passed the Statesman test (with an 85% or higher)
- 50 multiple choice questions
- Also contains a written component
- Must make an 85% or higher to receive Distinguished Statesman

- Tests a member's knowledge in a specific FCS area
- Top 3 in each test will be recognized onstage at the 2020
 State Leadership Conference
- Members can only take one test each year
- Members taking the same test must take it at the same
- time, if not it leads to disqualification

Online Proficiency Tests Tips and Tricks

- Must have a non-FCS/FCCLA proctor
- All testing information is sent to the proctor
- NO STUDY GUIDES ARE PROVIDED.
- Test questions are based off classroom standards
- 50 multiple choice questions

Chicken Fabrication

- Individual event
- Fabricate a chicken (provided) into eight pieces meeting industry standards
- Must be currently or previously enrolled in a Culinary Arts class
- 10 minutes to set up, 20 minutes to fabricate and present, 10 minutes to clean up

Creative Showpiece

- Individual event
- Use a variety of fruits/vegetables to prepare and display a culinary showpiece
- Must be currently or previously enrolled in a Culinary Arts class
- Theme for 2020: Georgia Grown Products
- One-hour time limit including set up, production, presentation and clean up

Creed Speaking & Interpretation

- Individual event
- Open to all FCCLA members
- Middle school and high school categories
- Chapters can submit up to 3 entries/students
- Recite creed from memory (2 minutes max)
- Answer 3 questions concerning meaning of the creed and how it fits to the participant's personal philosophy


Digital Delish Dish

- Individual or team event (1-3 members)
- Open to all FCCLA members
- Middle school and high school event categories
- 1-minute video
- Food demonstration including at least one food science fact and one Georgia grown ingredient




Digital Storytelling

- Individual or partner event (1-2 members)
- Event categories:
 - Middle school must be enrolled or previously enrolled in a middle school FCS course
 - High school must be enrolled or previously enrolled in an ECE or TAP class
- 1½ 2-minute video about one ECE or TAP standard



- · Prepares for learning later in his/her life
- Baby begins to pick up rhythm, tone, and inflections





Food Science Investigation

- Individual or team event (1-3 members)
- Open to all FCCLA members
- Middle school and high school event categories
- Video up to 3-minutes about food science facts in action



Knife Skills

- Individual event
- Open to culinary students
- 5 knife cuts
- 10 minutes to set up, 50 minutes to produce and arrange knife cuts, and 10 minutes to clean up

Power of One

- Individual event
- Open to all FCCLA members
- No limit on number of competitors per chapter
- Members complete all Power of One units and create a portfolio documenting their five projects
- No placements (1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc.) all members can receive recognition if they complete all aspects of the rubric

Toys That Teach

- Individual event
- Event categories:
 - Middle school must be enrolled or previously enrolled in a middle school FCS course
 - High school must be enrolled or previously enrolled in an ECE or TAP class
- Design, build and demonstrate an original homemade toy that provides learning and play for a child or small group of children




STAR Events Types – Display Events

 Displays are measured from the very top (or bottom) of any materials beyond the actual board

 Items within the display may be used as in-hand visuals during the oral presentation; however, they must be returned within the display dimensions when done

STAR Events Types – File Folder (with Visuals) Events

- Culinary Math Management (aka... Applied Math for Culinary Management)
- Interior Design
- Interpersonal Communications
- National Programs in Action
- Professional Presentation (aka... Illustrated Talk)
- Sports Nutrition

- An individual member may participate in only one national STAR Event in any given year. Participation is open to any nationally affiliated FCCLA chapter member. Events may have additional eligibility requirements.
- 2. Participants must follow national rules for competition, or risk possible disqualification or loss of points.
- 3. All STAR Events projects must be developed and completed during a one-year span beginning July 1 and ending June 30.

- 4. All STAR Events projects must be planned and prepared by the **participant(s) only**. Supporting resources are acceptable as long as participants are coordinating their use and resources are cited appropriately verbally and/or in print during the presentation to avoid false credit for unoriginal or non- participant work. Participants are encouraged to use original materials, items licensed for reuse, or items in which copyright permission has been granted.
- 5. State and chapter advisers should ensure that <u>identical</u> <u>presentations of the same project are not entered into STAR Events multiple years</u>.

- 6. Participants are not allowed to distribute any materials to the evaluators unless the event rules specifically allow it. Evaluators are not allowed to keep any items given to them by STAR Events participants.
- 7. No projects can be entered in more than one category of a single event, or in more than one event. However, projects entered in any event may be included in the Chapter in Review events.
- 8. Chapters are allowed to enter only one entry in Chapter in Review Display and Chapter in Review Portfolio per category.

Eligibility and General Rules... Often Overlooked

9. Chapters are allowed to enter only one entry in FCCLA Chapter Website.

10. Spectators are not allowed to observe any portion of any STAR Event. Videotaping and/or audio recording of events is not allowed.

11. Participants are to maintain a professional appearance and attitude during all STAR Events activities.

Eligibility and General Rules... Often Overlooked

12. Participants are responsible for their own event materials, and may not have others assist them with event setup, including moving items into the competition area.

Any items left behind are not the responsibility of FCCLA and may be discarded.

13. STAR Events resources (topics, scenarios, templates, etc.) can be found online on the national website.

Eligibility and General Rules... Often Overlooked

14. For Fashion Construction, Fashion Design and Recycle and Redesign, lingerie and swimsuits are not allowed. Clothing that does not meet acceptable standards of modesty/appropriateness for a school function or setting is prohibited.

Eligibility and General Rules... Often Overlooked

15. If a participant fails to adhere to event guidelines or event definition, or prepares an item not based on the current event scenario, then the sample/display/project is ineligible for evaluation. The participant will still be able to compete with an oral presentation if they choose to do so, and will only be scored on the oral presentation.

- 16. Participants may present in front, behind, or beside the designated table or space. Participants may not place items on the consultant or evaluator tables.
- 17. All materials on displays must be placed on a clearly defined presentation surface. Displays with a clearly defined front presentation surface (such as tri-fold boards) may not have items on the back of the board, as consultants/evaluators would not be expected to look behind a display for project components. Displays with multiple presentation sides may have materials on all clearly defined presentation surfaces. All materials must be easily viewed, accessible, and legible.

STAR Event Orientations

Onsite Orientation is REQUIRED at REGION and STATE
