Members of Mossy Creek Middle School FCCLA and FFA stated "I wouldn't trade the experience with my team for anything!".




"Sock"ecessful "Sock"tober Submitted by Emily Boatright

Colquitt County High School hosted their first "Sock"tober the week of October 26-28, 2022. The event was publicized through flyers that were posted around the school and placed in the faculty mailboxes. Students and faculty were encouraged to bring in new socks or monetary donations for three consecutive days. At the end of each day, FCCLA members would tally up the totals collected during the student's Advisement period. The overall totals were announced the following morning on their school wide announcements to encourage more donations. After three days of collecting, CCHS FCCLA collected 82 pairs of socks and raised \$254.97 which was used to purchase new socks.

The Advisement class with the most donations received a Chick-fil-a breakfast courtesv of CCHS FCCLA on Monday, October 31st. 5 Lessons that I have Learned as a State Officer Submitted by Andy Lu

Georgia FCCLA past First Vice President, Andy Lu, has some words to share about what he's learned as a state officer, "Throughout my year as the First Vice President, I have grown exponentially in my leadership, character, and life skills. This growth could not have been done without some important lessons that I have learned. I will be sharing the 5 most important ones that I believe have helped me and will help others".

Lesson 1: Slow Down. This was a lesson that was very quick for me to learn. I have always been a very fast talker my whole life. My brain is always moving much much faster than my mouth. During various interviews and especially my SOC speech, I talk way too fast. After becoming a State Officer, I would get told to slow down every single time I did any public speaking practices. Over time, I learned to think more when talking and to remind myself mentally to slow down. Doing this allows me to articulate my words more clearly and create inflection in my voice. This can also be applied in terms of taking in memories during my term of office. This year has flown by and it does not seem like I have been serving the members of Georgia FCCLA this long.

Lesson 2: Mental Health Matters. This was another lesson that I learned fairly quickly. At June SEC, I was constantly around people 24/7. Since it was in conjunction with CTSO Training, it meant that there was a whole week where I was constantly around people and needed to be professional and engaged. I learned that my energy was quickly drained. Talking with my advisers really helped me realize that I needed space. Whenever I get free time, I should take a step back and decompress. This allows me to get my energy back and be professional and engaged when it mattered the most.

Lesson 3: Do it Right the First Time. I learned this lesson near the start of my term. Whenever we had a post or project, I had a tendency at times to have typos and other mistakes. After we got our work reviewed, if there was a mistake, I had to take more time to go and fix it. To save myself and others time, I learned to always use a spell checker, read my information out loud, and have someone double-check. This has dramatically saved me time as well as the State Staff that review my items. It is important to always read guidelines and form a plan so you do not have to do something twice, versus doing the same thing over and over.

Lesson 4: Be Willing to Take Criticism. This is a lesson that has dramatically shaped who I was. At first, I did not like it when someone would point out a flaw or a mistake that I made. I felt embarrassed and I believed that I could be perfect. Over time, I learned that the criticism was making me better and that I was learning. My mental attitude changed from "I don't want criticism" to "Please tell me how I can do better". The attitude change to taking criticism changed everything and allowed me to become a better State Officer and person.

Lesson 5: Bounce Back. This last lesson is one that I am still learning and working on. Not everything goes as planned and goes my way. It can range from failing a test that I studied hard for to not placing in a certain event. Even though it sucks and is hard, I know that I can always do better next time and bounce back from it. There is always another chance and if there is not, then there is always another opportunity for something different. At first, it might seem terrible, but after some time it won't be as bad and you might be happy that it happened.




